Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

**Latest Information on Sunday Masses:** Coming Sunday October 04, as we had the last two Sundays, there will be a Mass at 10:30 a.m. in the school yard. **Up to 200 people are allowed.** Please do let your families and friends know. Let's observe all the safety protocols. If you have a need for the hand sanitizer, please do bring your own. Obviously, masks and social distancing are mandatory. The weather forecast is: 68 degrees F. Please dress appropriately.

**Weekday Masses Starting:** Monday October 5th onwards, I'll be celebrating a Mass at 8:00 a.m. every day in the Church. Only 25% capacity, which will be 100 people for our church, will be allowed for our indoor Masses. Please do come join, if you are able to.

**Mass Saturday Oct. 3<sup>rd</sup> with the Archbishop:** To observe the originally planned Rosary Rally and the Feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the Archbishop will be celebrating a vigil Mass at 7:00 p.m. coming Saturday October 3<sup>rd</sup> in the Cathedral grounds. Before the Mass, there will be a candle-light procession from St. Anthony of Padua Church to the Cathedral. After the Mass, the rosary will be recited. Everyone is welcome to join!

**Please Continue Supporting St. Elizabeth Parish:** As I have said, I'm edified and inspired by your weekly donations to our parish. Despite the Covid reality all around us, you are amazing in your love for the parish and the continued support you give. Thank you!

**Feast of St. Francis of Assisi:** October 4th is the feast of St. Francis of Assisi, the patron saint of our own city of San Francisco. Let's meditate on these words and see how we could respond.

**Let's Keep Praying For:** All those affected by Covid, the wildfires, and the racial conflicts. Let's pray also for the looming elections and for discernment to choose the leaders according to the mind and heart of Christ.



### THE GIFT OF THE REIGN OF GOD

Matthew's Gospel today expands on Isaiah's ballad considerably. A comparison with the same story in Mark's Gospel clearly shows us that here the author is busy teaching this community of Jewish Christians: "This is a story about Israel a long time ago; this is also a story about Jesus and the skeptical leaders."

Jesus as much as told these Jewish leaders that they were the tenants who first stoned their own prophets. And he told the leaders they were the tenants who would soon even dispose of him—Jesus—and, in doing so, would forfeit their privileged place of presenting to the world the promised Messiah.

"And this," says Matthew's Gospel, "is a story about you, the inheritors of what was first offered to Israel." The reign of God was first opened to Israel and is now given to the whole world, but it must be received as a gift. The first Christians are the new tenants in the vineyard. The deeper reality of the reign or kingdom of God is that it is available to everyone on the face of the earth—Israel included. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.
