Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

Eastering Jesus: The British Jesuit poet Gerard Manley Hopkins in his poem "The Wreck of the Deutschland" says: "Let him easter in us, be a dayspring to the dimness of us, be a crimson-crested east." Hopkins is convinced that the meaning of Easter is that the risen Christ keeps doing his "eastering" in our lives. Easter, therefore, can be viewed as a verb rather than a noun. Easter is not so much a one-day event but a continuous process of what the risen Christ can do in our lives. He can give us healing and forgiving love. Again and again, when he enters the locked doors, he does not criticize or reprove the disciples for having abandoned or denied or betrayed him, but all he offers is: "Peace be with you." That is how Jesus easter in us. His Easter presence is intimate and transformative. He uplifts and gives hope. We can be turned away from fear to courage; from sinfulness to grace; from anxiety to peace. Jesus wants to easter in us this Easter season. Shall we have the love and faith to let him easter in us?

Daily Mass Change of Schedule June 1 Onwards: Daily Mass from June 1 onwards will be at 8:30 a.m. instead of 8:00 a.m. It's because of the Morning Prayer (Divine Office) that will start at 8:10 a.m. followed by Mass at 8:30.

Sunday Mass Schedule Change May 16 Onwards: Starting on Sunday May 16, instead of 10:00 a.m. Sunday Mass, we will have 9:30 a.m. Sunday Mass. As you know, 9:30 a.m. was the original timing of a Mass in our parish. When the time comes, when conditions are good, we shall add one or two Masses, as necessary, to our weekend Mass schedule. Right now, up to 250 people are allowed to attend an indoor Mass in our parish, which would be about 50% capacity.

50 Plus Club: I attended this group's meeting and lunch on Thursday April 22 in Cantwell Hall. It was the first social event in the hall since the pandemic hit. I was impressed with the spirit of community, hospitality, and arrangements. Congrats to Elsa Reginato, Emma Magarrell and other officials of this group. About 35 people attended. Also important are our social events. So let's begin to have our social events, of course, cautiously but hopefully, with safety protocols in place, as we care for each other's health and happiness.

BEARING FRUIT

Few of us, even when we meditate on the image of the vine and branches, stop to really think about how God "prunes" us. For some there is the danger of thinking that we are already producing fruit for the kingdom, in deed and truth as John says, perhaps raising a family, being active in our parish, and so on. But even those branches which are bearing fruit, the Gospel tells us, can be pruned to produce still more. Today Saul, freshly "pruned" by his conversion, arrives in Jerusalem and meets resistance. Since he had been persecuting Christians, this was only natural. But even after he is accepted and begins to bear fruit, he meets further adversity, and his letters are filled with many accounts of how his trials "pruned" him to produce greater fruit for the kingdom. Like him, as long as we remain in Christ we will continue to bear fruit and, when the will of the Father determines it is time to prune us, the strength of the true vine must enable us to endure it.
