Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

Season of Lent: This special season started with a bang on Ash Wednesday, when Catholics come out into the church in big numbers. We had our foreheads marked with the words, "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return." It's pretty strong language; a wake-up call. The meaning of the ashes accompanied with this reminder is that our lives in this world are not permanent. In fact, we do not own anything, even though we have an illusion of it. If we really, really owned anything, we should be able to take it into the next world. Since obviously we cannot take anything beyond this world, we are only entrusted with certain things and blessings in this world, which we need to be responsible stewards of. In other words, we are to gain perspective on what to do in this life, how to live and love, how to relate to people and things, what is important and what is not, what is eternal and what is not, what matters and what doesn't, what is true happiness and what isn't. When we are able to see these things better, it is then we truly begin to live from the soul. Lent is a special time to figure these things out. Sometimes, we can go through decades of life or a whole lifetime, without discovering what God wants us to do and how he wants us to live. While we are engaged in all sorts of spiritual activities this season, let all these efforts converge on a deepening and maturing of our relationship with God and others where love and humility flourish. Happy hunting this season of Lent---for things money cannot buy!

Archdiocesan Annual Appeal (AAA): It's final week of our concerted month-long campaign. Our goal is \$37,462. Donation of 1.33% would be \$500. Please give as early and as generously as possible. We are starting the fourth and final week of the month-long drive of AAA. You may have seen the names of all the donors so far for AAA 2023 in the bulletin. We are making steady progress, but without your help we cannot accomplish it. Last week at all the Masses, after the homily, Antonia and Carol Valasco spoke reminding us of the need for AAA in our support for the Archdiocesan ministries. I thank them for their generosity in spending time for the parish and the Archdiocese and for sharing their thoughts on AAA with the whole parish. I encourage and urge everyone to participate in AAA so that we can make a success of this project once again. Please keep in mind that even during the pandemic, our parish reached the goal and even exceeded it. Please give 1.33% (\$500), if possible. As I said before, if everyone could think about a minimum AAA

donation of \$100 to \$200, it would be fantastic! Any excess funds will be returned to us and we could use them for our parish projects, especially toward the maintenance of the buildings.

Word of God: Temptation & Sin: In the first reading from Genesis this First Sunday of Lent, we are told how the first parents were tempted and succumbed to sin. In the gospel, Jesus is tempted, but he stands his ground and overcomes temptations. In the second reading from the Letter to the Romans, Paul contrasts the first Adam with the second Adam, Jesus, on the basis of sin and grace. Jesus is faithful to his Father and to all of us. This Lenten season of reappraisal and renewal, the Word of God challenges us to look at the many situations, where we are being led astray by all sorts of enticements, allurements, and attractions. While none of us is perfect, we are invited to keep making the effort at holiness and wholeness. Awareness of our situation would be a big part of this process. If we can see deeply and inwardly, we would awaken to God's love and our sinfulness. With God's grace we shall be purified, redeemed, anointed, and empowered for the way to be human and Christian according to the mind and heart of Christ. This is what Lent is all about.

We hear today of God's unrelenting pursuit of us. Our readings tell stories of God's intense desire to share the divine life with us. From Exodus, we see how God shows endless persistence and compassion, even to those who grumble against God, or seem to have forgotten God. From the Gospel of John, we hear of how Jesus, in his extended conversation with the Samaritan woman, gives her dignity, names uncomfortable truths, and gradually leads her into a new path of faith. We can have confidence that as we bring our own confusions, fears, and failings to God, we may receive God's mercy and forgiveness. God always persists and continually finds new ways to invite people into unity with God. As Paul describes in Romans, in the cross we see how God will go to any length to demonstrate the depth and breadth of divine love.

LENTEN REMINDERS AND REGULATIONS:

The following regulations are in place for abstaining and fasting during Lent:

During Lent, every Friday the 8:30 am Mass will be followed by the Stations of the Cross.

Abstinence : Everyone fourteen years of age and older is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday.

Fast: Everyone eighteen years of age and older but under the age of sixty is bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

On these two days, the law of fast allows one full meal a day, but does not prohibit taking some food during the day, so long as this does not constitute another full meal. Drinking liquids during the day is permitted. When health or the ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige. In doubt concerning fast or abstinence, a priest assigned to pastoral ministry or confessor should be consulted.

In the spirit of penance, the faithful should not lightly excuse themselves from this obligation.
