A message from
Father Charles Puthota

Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

Father's Day: To all the fathers, Happy Father's Day! For some of us, our fathers are with us and what a blessing it is for us to love and cherish them --- and take care of them! For some others, our fathers have gone to their eternal reward. My father Isaac at age 89 returned to God at the end of December in 2017. I'm still grieving, and I know that those of you who have lost your fathers, no matter how long ago, still grieve and miss them. Love makes us do that. There is a void in us that no one will fill until we are united with our dear departed. We celebrate our fathers who are with us and shall always keep the sacred memory of those fathers who have gone to eternal reward. In all our fathers, we cannot but see God Himself. Isn't it profoundly comforting that God himself is our Father? Jesus called God his Abba (Father) and taught us to pray the "Our Father" and relate to Him as His children. Our Father loves us with an everlasting and unconditional love. He makes the rain fall on the good and the bad and lets the sun shine on sinners and saints alike. Such is his abiding and awesome love. Because we are all the children of the one Father, we become intimately connected with one another as sisters and brothers. How could we then not take care of one another in our need? How could we let anyone in this human family be deprived of basic needs and necessities? As we celebrate Father's Day, let's strive to make sure that the Father's blessings flow to the whole of human family abundantly and ceaselessly.

Father's Day Blessing Prayer: Heavenly Father, you entrusted your Son Jesus, the child of Mary, to the care of Joseph, an earthly father. Bless all fathers as they care for their families. Give them strength and wisdom, tenderness and patience; support them in the work they are called to do, protecting those who look to them, as we look to you for love and salvation, through our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

Word of God--the Call to be Apostles: The Gospel this Sunday names the twelve apostles. Jesus is concerned about how few the laborers are there to take care of the abundant harvest. The apostles are called and given authority over "unclean spirits" and to cure "every disease and every illness." There are forces and powers of evil in the world. The apostles are needed to drive out the dark powers and help usher in the powers of light and goodness. Jesus sends them out by asking them to proclaim the dawning of the Kingdom of God. He tells them "to cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse lepers, drive out demons."

We are the apostles today. Jesus calls us and graces us and sends us out. "Come and go" would be the summary of our Christian life. Jesus says to us to "come" because we need to remain with him and learn from the Master. Then he would say to us to "go" because we need to go out to help, heal, uplift, and make this world a better place for all of us. Are we ready and willing to be the apostles that Jesus needs for the world of today?

A Story to Ponder: To please an official Abraham Lincoln once signed an order transferring certain regiments. Secretary of War, Stanton, convinced that the President had made a serious mistake, refused to carry out the order. And for good measure he added "Lincoln is a fool!" When this was reported to Lincoln he said, "If Stanton said I am a fool then I must be one, for he is almost always right. I think I'll step over and see for myself." That is exactly what he did. Stanton convinced him that the order was a mistake and Lincoln promptly withdrew it. Everyone knew that part of Lincoln's greatness lay in the way he welcomed criticism.

A Bit of History of our own St. Elizabeth Parish: On March 17, 1907, St. Elizabeth was established as a mission church. Fourteen people attended the first Mass which was celebrated at the home of a parishioner since there was no official building. A pastor was soon appointed to this new parish and a temporary church was built at the cost of \$450.

Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time June 18, 2023

As Catholics, we are called to be missionary disciples, spreading the love of Christ to all those we encounter. This can be done in small ways, through acts of kindness and invitations to prayer or worship. By embracing our role as evangelizers, we can share the good news of the Gospel and help others to encounter the transformative power of Christ's love.



- **First Reading** – [Exodus 19:2-6a](#): The Israelites arrive at Mount Sinai, where God speaks to Moses and tells him to convey a message to the people. God reminds the Israelites of how He delivered them from slavery in Egypt and declares that if they obey His commands and keep His covenant, they will be a treasured possession and a kingdom of priests.
- **Responsorial Psalm** – [Psalm 100](#): This passage is a call to all people to praise and serve the Lord joyfully, recognizing that we are His people and the sheep of His flock. The verses emphasize God's goodness, His role as creator and caretaker of His people, and His eternal kindness and faithfulness.
- **Second Reading** – [Romans 5:6-11](#): God showed His love for humanity by sending Jesus Christ to die for our sins while we were still sinners. Through Jesus' sacrifice, we can be reconciled with God and receive the gift of eternal life.
- **Gospel** – [Matthew 9:36—10:8](#): Jesus has compassion for the crowds. He decides to send out His twelve disciples to heal the sick, raise the dead, and proclaim the good news of the kingdom of heaven. Jesus instructs His disciples to freely give what they have received, encouraging them to serve others with love and generosity.


