From the Pastor's Desktop

A message from Father Charles Puthota

October 8, 2023

Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

Synod on Synodality: Thy Synod is now meeting this October 4 through 29 in the Vatican. The theme is: Communion, Participation, Mission. Let's keep the synod meetings in our hearts and prayers. May the Holy Spirit guide all their dialogues and deliberations. We need to explore ways of relating the Church to the world of today and the world to the Church. We are called to proclaim the good news to the world of the 21st century. Tradition and creative fidelity guided by the Spirit of Christ are urgently needed. According to *America* magazine, the synod will have 365 full members, including the Holy Father who is president of the synod. Among the full members are 54 women. The total number of participants at the synod, however, is 464, of whom 81 are women. This number includes experts and fraternal delegates. 61 experts and facilitators will not have a vote at the synod. There will be some participants from other churches. Prior to the Synod, from September 30 through October 03, a retreat for the participants will be conducted by Fr. Timothy Radcliffe, O.P. and Sr. Maria Angelini, O.S.B. There will be five official language groups at the synod: 14 small groups in English, 8 in Italian, 7 in Spanish, 5 in French, 1 in Portuguese.

The Sacred Scripture: From the Compendium of the Catechism of the Catholic Church: Why does Sacred Scripture teach the truth? Because God himself is the author of Sacred Scripture. For this reason, it is said to be inspired and to teach without error those truths which are necessary for our salvation. The Holy Spirit inspired the human authors who wrote what he wanted to teach us. The Christian faith, however, is not a "religion of the Book", but of the Word of God - "not a written and mute word, but incarnate and living" (Saint Bernard of Clairvaux). **How is** Sacred Scripture to be read? Sacred Scripture must be read and interpreted with the help of the Holy Spirit and under the guidance of the Magisterium of the Church according to three criteria: 1) it must be read with attention to the content and unity of the whole of Scripture; 2) it must be read within the living Tradition of the Church; 3) it must be read with attention to the analogy of faith, that is, the inner harmony which exists among the truths of the faith themselves. What is the Canon of **Scripture?** The *Canon* of Scripture is the complete list of the sacred writings which the Church has come to recognize through Apostolic Tradition. The Canon consists of 46 books of the Old Testament and 27 of the New.

October Month Dedicated to Our Lady of the Rosary:

Word of God: 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time: Bear fruit for the

Father: The gospel this Sunday is another parable about the vineyard (last Sunday it's about two sons called into work in the vineyard; the previous Sunday it was about workers sent into the vineyard at different times of the day with equal pay for all). This Sunday, the landowner sends his servants (prophets) to obtain produce (our good deeds of love and service) from the tenants (the civil and religious leaders). The servants are humiliated, insulted, and killed. He sends finally his own son (Jesus Christ) thinking that they would respect and receive him, but even the son is killed mercilessly. The landowner is heartbroken, but he has tried everything he could. He has no choice now but to turn the vineyard over to new tenants (the church; all those who would accept his son as the Messiah) who will produce fruit for the landowner. The second reading from the letter to the Philippians is one of my favorite readings, where Paul might well be speaking of the fruit that the new tenants will produce for the heavenly Father: "Whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things."

BEARING THE RIGHT KIND OF FRUIT

Today's readings focus our attention on vineyards. Isaiah's song concerning his friend's vineyard begins with inspiring and poetic images of an idyllic vineyard where the choicest harvest is expected. Instead, the vineyard yields wild grapes, which causes the owner to abandon it. The psalmist cries out to God, asking that God once again take care of the vineyard, which is the house of Israel. The parable told in today's Gospel offers a stern warning that those who commit treachery in the hopes of attaining personal wealth will be "put . . . to a wretched death" (Matthew 21:41). Jesus warns his listeners not to act like the murderous tenants in the vineyard. Instead, he exhorts them to produce the kind of fruit that will lead them to the kingdom of God.

The Synod on Synodality

October 2021 to October 2024

Theme: Communion, Participation, Mission: The Synod on Synodality is a three-year process of listening and dialogue that began with a solemn opening in Rome on October 9 and 10, 2021. The synodal process will conclude in 2024. Each individual diocese in the whole world has gone through a process of preparation for the Synod. The Synod is both an event and a process in which the whole People of God are called to walk to gather together toward what the Holy Spirit helps it to discern as being the Lord's will for his Church. Pope Francis has invited the entire Church to reflect on a theme that is decisive for its life and mission: "It is precisely this path of synodality which God expects of the Church of the third millennium. This journey, which follows in the wake of the Church's "renewal" proposed by the Second Vatican Council, is both a gift and a task: by journeying together and reflecting together on the path that has been made, the Church will be able to learn through Her experience which processes can help Her to live communion, to achieve participation, and to open Herself to mission." The 16th Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops will be held in two sessions. The first one from October 4 to 29, 2023. The second session will be in October 2024.
