A message from Father Charles Puthota

November 5, 2023

Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

Remembering the Dear Departed Souls in November: This whole month we would do well keeping in our hearts and minds the dear departed from our own families and among our circles of friends and acquaintances. We commemorate all those who have been called to God. We hold their memory sacred. We loved them in life, we continue to love them in death. Life is changed, not ended. Love is stronger than death. We bring our love, faith, and prayers to support them in their journey of purification and attainment of perfection with God. It has always been a tradition in the Catholic faith to visit graves on All Souls Day and in the month of November. Let's make time for that. As we stand at their graves, as we may shed tears and be filled with loss and grief, let us know that God will wipe away all the tears and grant the departed souls eternal peace and fulfillment. It is also an occasion for us to think of life and death. Awareness of death can make life more precious and beautiful. Against the background of death, life takes on great urgency and acute significance. Because of death, we are to live better lives. Because of death, we have to become the sort of people God wants us to be in this life. Because of death, we need to become more authentic disciples and apostles of Jesus. Because of death, love becomes not only necessary but also urgent. "Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them. May they rest in peace! Amen. May their souls and the souls of all the faithful departed through the mercy of God rest in peace. Amen."

All Souls Names on the Altar: If you would like your dear departed remembered, please list their names on the designated envelopes, and after placing your offering inside, leave them in the parish office or in the collection baskets or with a sacristan. We will place those envelopes for the whole month of November on the altar and pray for their eternal rest and reward in heaven.

Faith: From the Compendium of the Catechism of the Catholic Church: How does man respond to God who reveals himself? Sustained by divine grace, we respond to God with the obedience of faith, which means the full surrender of ourselves to God and the acceptance of his truth insofar as it is guaranteed by

the One who is Truth itself. Who are the principal witnesses of the obedience of faith in the Sacred Scriptures? There are many such witnesses, two in particular: One is *Abraham* who when put to the test "believed in God" (*Romans* 4:3) and always obeyed his call. For this reason he is called "the Father of all who believe" (*Romans* 4:11-18). The other is the *Virgin Mary* who, throughout her entire life, embodied in a perfect way the obedience of faith: "Let it be done to me according to your word" (*Luke* 1:38).

Word of God: This 31st Sunday in Ordinary Time, the gospel reading is about hypocrisy versus authenticity. Time and again, we see that Jesus is disappointed with the religious and civil leaders for the wide gap between what the profess and practice. Their teachings may be worth following, but their ability to practice what they teach lags far behind. Mahatma Gandhi said: "My life is my message." That declaration would fit our Lord Jesus Christ in a supreme way. What Jesus proclaims he practices with extraordinary authenticity. Love, forgiveness, humility, detachment, compassion, simplicity, faith, prayer, truth, hope, kingdom, peace---all these teachings of Jesus are actually embodied in his life. Whereas, the religious leaders burden the people with all sorts of requirements while not helping them in any way; they make a superficial display of religion; seek places of honor; operate from a position of superiority while showing contempt for others. There is a warning for those in positions of authority both in religion and government, that what they preach needs to be always followed through in their own conduct. There is a saying: "Don't tell me what to do; show me what you did."

Due to the large volume of Mass requests and in order to be fair to the needs of all our parishioners, the following is the Mass Book policy as set by Father Charles Puthota, Pastor:

Initially, each parishioner can request up to

10 Masses per year. Only 2 of those Masses may
be on weekends depending on availabilty.

<u>All Masses</u> including the Saturday Vigil Mass and Sunday Mass will be accepting two intentions per Mass.

We do not accept individual Mass Intentions for holidays or holy days including the following: Ash Wednesday, Easter, Mother's Day, Father's Day, All Souls, All Saints, Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve and Christmas. The intentions will be for the entire St. Elizabeth Community.

Due to the volume of requests and limited office hours, Masses cannot be reserved by phone or in person. Requests must be submitted in writing or by email (prefered): stelizabethchurchsf@gmail.com

Not all dates are available for Mass Intentions, so we ask that you be prepared with alternate dates and times. If your requested date is not available an alternate date will be chosen for you.
