We cannot allow pessimism or cynicism to taint the quality of life in the New Year. Let hope spring eternal in our hearts, motivating us to grapple with this new chunk of time with optimism and joy. If God is for us, who can be against us? Thanks to all that has been in 2023! Yes to all that shall be in 2024! As Moses says: "The Lord bless you and keep you! The Lord let his face shine upon you, and be gracious to you! The Lord look upon you kindly and give you peace!" (Numbers 6: 24-26).

Thank You: The Advent Season, the Simbang Gabi Masses and Reception for nine days before Christmas and Christmas day itself went very well, thanks to the volunteers at our parish who gave so much of themselves joyfully. Especially the "Morning Worshippers" were most generously invested in the success of all our spiritual and social celebrations connected with this holy season. Sunday, December 31, Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph: Love God and love one another. This is the love commandment practiced wholeheartedly by the Holy Family. Family is the "school of love." What we do in family right from our earliest stages shapes the course of our life. The Holy Family made up of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph admirably loved God and loved one another. This family love led them outside of the family into the larger arena of life to love people--and help and heal and transform the world. Joseph had to accept the divine promptings and take Mary into his home, a situation fraught with some uncertainty and confusion. Mary herself had to conceive the child by the overshadowing of the Holy Spirit. Not everything was crystal clear. Mary and Joseph had to pick their way with God's guidance and light. This Holy Family filled with God's blessings faced danger and vulnerability. They had to flee to another country in the face of death threats to the divine baby. Through it all, they were faithfully obedient to God's will and purpose. With Jesus in their house, God's blessings profoundly filled their lives. Jesus grew in wisdom and knowledge. When Jesus was lost on their pilgrimage to Jerusalem, they had to deal with anxiety and anguish. The Holy Family was not at all free from worry and sorrow and sadness. But they said yes to God's will generously,

continuously, joyfully, and totally. The Holy Family is a perfect model for all families to live in love and trust and obedience; a model for us about to give and take; a shining example of simplicity and authenticity. They didn't have much in the material sense, but they were rich in love; they had everything needed to be the family God called them to be.

Monday, January 1, Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God: Not a Holy Day of Obligation this year. Parish Mass at 8:30 a.m. We begin a whole new year with the feast of Mary, the Mother of God. Let's entrust this year in the hands of the loving Mother. Elizabeth declares at the Visitation: "Most blessed are you among women and blessed is the fruit of your womb. And how does this happen to me that the mother of my Lord should come to me?" Let the new beginnings this year, perhaps with some new resolutions, be based on love that Mary the Mother of God began by becoming the Mother of the Son of God. Through the affection of Mary, the Mother of God, may we come closer to Christ our Lord and do whatever he tells us to do this new year of 2024.

BEARERS OF THE WORD

The Church has placed a number of notable feast days immediately after Christmas. The feasts of Stephen, John the Evangelist, and the Holy Innocents form a summary of the life lived in Christ, the Word made flesh. What do these have to do with the feast of the Holy Family, which crowns the Octave of Christmas? These feasts remind us that suffering will continue in fulfilling the mission of Christ, and that we are all called to be bearers of this Word whose birth we celebrate.

We also see this manifested in the lives of Joseph and Mary, both of whom took social and religious risks in obedience to the will of God, and both of whom were open to the word of God sent to them from on high. In these ways they prefigured the life of Jesus himself.

Most likely, few of us found ourselves at Mass this past Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday, but the essence of these feasts and the essence of the holiness of Joseph, Mary, and Jesus remain central, a holiness we celebrate today. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co., Inc.

2024 Mass Intentions Now Available! Please follow the guidelines below when sending in your Mass requests.

Due to the large volume of Mass requests and in order to be fair to the needs of all our parishioners, the following is the Mass Book policy as set by Father Charles Puthota, Pastor:

Initially, each parishioner can request up to **12 Masses per year. Only 2 of those Masses may be on weekends depending on availability.**

All Masses including the Saturday Vigil Mass and Sunday Mass, (10:30 am) will be accepting two intentions per Mass.

We do not accept individual Mass Intentions for holidays or holy days including the following:

Ash Wednesday, Easter, Mother's Day, Father's Day, All Souls, All Saints, Thanksgiving, Christmas Eve and Christmas. The intentions will be for the entire St. Elizabeth Community.

Masses cannot be reserved by phone or in person.

Not all dates are available for Mass Intentions, so we ask that you be prepared with alternate dates and times. If your requested date is not available an alternate date will be chosen for you.
