From the Pastor's Desktop

A message from Father Charles Puthota

January 21, 2024

Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

Laudato Deum: You may be familiar with Pope Francis' encyclical "Laudato Si" of 2015 in which he had spoken about the climate change and its impact on ecological, social, and economic issues. In a follow-up apostolic exhortation, "Laudato Deum" (Praise God), the Holy Father issued on October 4, 2023 (Feastday of St. Francis of Assisi) calls for urgent action against the climate crisis and criticizes those who deny the climate change as well as the governments of the world that do little to counter the climate change. The Pope says that the planet is approaching a "point of no return" as global warming hurtles toward the maximum recommended limit of 1.5 degrees Celsius (2.7 Fahrenheit) higher than the pre-industrial average." He adds: "Even if we do not reach this point of no return, it is certain that the consequences would be disastrous and precipitous measures would have to be taken, at enormous cost and with grave and intolerable economic and social effects." The Pope observes that the international organizations and conferences such as COP (Conference of Parties) since 1995 have not produced practical results. Science has been throwing clearer light on the crisis, but the nations and organizations have not been able to implement concrete measures to preserve and protect the earth. Pope Francis appeals to a renewed vision of community. He challenges Catholics to be prophetic in their solidarity with the poor and the disadvantaged. Jesus is at the heart of this enterprise. We are to collaborate with him in our awareness and action to care for our common home, the Planet Earth.

Word of God: Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Call of the Apostles: Jesus calls. The call is continuous and constant. Last Sunday we meditated on the call of the little boy Samuel and that of the disciples of John who follow Jesus and respond to the invitation to "come and see." The Word of God this Sunday speaks of the call of Jonah in the first reading and the call of the apostles Peter and his brother Andrew and John and his brother James. What is it that is so magnetic and mysterious about the call of Christ that the fishermen leave everything and follow Jesus on the shores of the Sea of Galilee? They give up what they have been doing, their families and fishing profession, and follow Jesus right away. They were unworthy, uneducated, and flawed, but Jesus sees great potential in them. Jesus sees not just who they are but what they could become if only they would generously collaborate with Jesus. Jesus is always looking at our reality and the potential. We are capable of all sorts of beautiful things for God and others. The call comes to us today, amidst our circumstances and situations. We need to hear that voice of Jesus in our hearts and souls. We need to be alert and discerning. That call of Jesus always entails, as T. S.

Eliot would say, "costing not less than everything." If we have to find fulfillment and happiness in life, we have to heed the call of Christ and respond generously. Our response would truly give glory to God and place us at the service of God's people.

Thursday, January 25 Conversion of St. Paul: Reflecting on the theme of the call in the Word of God this Sunday, we might like to see in that context the call of Saul who became Paul. It would be worth out time to look up the Italian painter Caravaggio's two powerful paintings on the conversion of Paul. The dramatic conversion of Paul is one of the most stunning and consequential happenings in the religious history of the world. Paul who was a fierce persecutor of Christianity becomes the most ardent promoter of it. Thanks to his going beyond the Jewish fold to the gentiles, Christianity opened up in an incredible way to many nations and cultures. But before all that, Jesus claimed Paul to himself. Paul in his letters again and again insists on how unworthy he was and yet Jesus called him and entrusted to him the mission to the gentiles. He was a sinner and yet Jesus sought after him and chose him to be an apostle. We are all called too, despite our sinfulness and unworthiness. Where there is sin, grace abounds! Jesus needs present-day apostles to proclaim God's love and mercy to the world of today, starting with our own families and neighborhoods. It's the new evangelization!

THE DEMANDS OF DISCIPLESHIP

Today we encounter readings that already have a Lenten feel about them. Nineveh undergoes a forty-day fast, the psalmist reminds us that God alone can show sinners the way. Paul shows us how fleeting the things and events of this world are, and Jesus cries out "Repent!" before he calls his new followers. "Come after me," Jesus says, but if we are to truly live out the commands and demands of our discipleship through baptism, we must first know our need for conversion, our repentance, our need to believe in the gospel fully. Today's Gospel opens with the stark reminder of what befell John the Baptist for completely living out his vocation as the herald of Christ and the gospel: he was arrested, imprisoned, and martyred. Though few of us will experience consequences that extreme, we must all be ready to risk some sort of rejection as, heeding the call of Jesus, we live out the kingdom of God at hand, repent of our sins, and believe in the good news of salvation.

Notice of Deadline for Filing Claims: <u>February 20, 2024</u>

YOU MAY HAVE A SEXUAL ABUSE CLAIM OR OTHER CLAIM AGAINST THE ARCHDIOCESE OF SAN FRANCISCO

On August 21, 2023, The Roman Catholic Archbishop of San Francisco, a California corporation sole, aka Archdiocese of San Francisco (the "Debtor"), filed for protection under chapter 11 of title 11 of the United States Code (the "Bankruptcy Code").

If you were sexually abused by any person connected with the Debtor, you must file a claim so as to be received by February 20, 2024, or otherwise you will be forever barred, estopped, and enjoined from asserting such claim against the Debtor.

Claims based on acts or omissions of the Debtor that occurred before August 21, 2023, must be filed on or before February 20, 2024, even if such claims are not now fixed, liquidated, or certain or did not mature or become fixed, liquidated, or certain before August 21, 2023.
