From the Pastor's Desktop

A message from Father Charles Puthota

January 28, 2024

Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

The Importance and Necessity of the Liturgy of the Word in the Mass: Some personal musings: Sometimes I observe some good, well-meaning Catholics who would like to attend Mass as quickly as possible and get back home or wherever they are going. They give the impression that if there is no Word of God and homily, they would be happier because that way they could get to the Communion as quickly as possible and go home. The Mass is ended, go in peace! Since we take the trouble after all of getting out of bed, giving up certain morning comforts and of being in the church, why not participate in the Mass by putting our heart and soul into it. One of the ways in which we could do this is by saying the liturgical prayers with more energy and volume. We are called to be active participants, not mere spectators.

Another way is to pay close attention to what the Word of God is challenging us to do and be. The Second Vatican Council over sixty years ago came up in its document called "Dei Verbum" (God's Word) with a vision about the importance of the Word of God. The misunderstanding that the Protestants took the Bible with them and we Catholics took the sacraments had to be dispelled. We Catholics are people of the Word and the Eucharist. That's why each Mass is a union of the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist. We cannot celebrate the Eucharist without first hearing, meditating and interpreting the Word of God. How many of us really pay attention to the Word of God? Hearing the Word of God and having it interpreted wakes us up from our at-times passive way of attending Mass. The purpose of the homily is to make some connection between the Word of God and life, and to let the scriptures come alive. We need to make a more serious effort, through our alertness and attention, at staying with the Word of God and exploring what it means for our lives, our families, and the world. After all, God speaks to us through these scriptures.

Remember how Jesus faces his three temptations by falling back on the scriptures? You may also recall how Jesus interprets the scriptures to the Emmaus disciples before he breaks the bread with them. When we go away from Mass, the questions we could be asking are: what did the Word of God interpreted in the homily speak to me for my life today? How can I be a better person and Catholic because of God's message for me today? Mass is not a passive ritual but a dynamic form of worship at which our mind (by being enlightened) and the heart (by being in communion with Jesus) are "nourished." Here's an is an example of how the Word of God changed a man completely from the annals of Jesuit history: St. Ignatius of Loyola kept asking Francis Xavier at the University of Paris in the 1530s: "What does it profit for someone to gain the whole world and forfeit one's soul?" This question of Jesus kept working in the soul of St. Francis Xavier; he gave up his wordly ambitions, joined the first group of Jesuits, and became the greatest missionary, second only to St. Paul.

Word of God this Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time: The responsorial psalm today calls us to think about this: "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts." This is something important not only in our faith-related matters but also in simple relationships. We are to hear others' voices. We have to open our ears to listen. It is possible that in our family, workplaces, and communities, we are so preoccupied with our own needs and desires that we are unable to hear others' voices. Once we are able to let others' voices reach our ears, we are better able to open also our hearts. This would apply in our relationship with God as well. God speaks and we have to hear his voice. There are other competing voices that drown out God's voice. It's like in the parable of the seeds and weeds---that the thorns choke the seeds to death. The same way, other voices can prevent us from hearing God's voice. When we hear God's voice, our hearts have to be ready and supple---not hard---to let that voice penetrate our hearts. Then our love can flower as a response to God speaking to us. Then discipleship can happen. We will hear the voice of Jesus and let it go straight to our hearts and we will follow him, giving up certain things and embracing certain other things. Therefore, if today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts!

TRUE PROPHETS

In Deuteronomy today we hear that God's very words will fill the mouth of a true prophet, but a false prophet will, in a manner of speaking, put mere mortal words into God's mouth. In Mark's Gospel, we see Jesus teaching and healing as a true prophet, one filled with the authority of God's own voice. The whole history of our church is filled with both true and false prophets. Some false prophets were extremely popular and quite well-versed in scripture, and even held positions of authority. But in today's Gospel we learn that Jesus' fame spread because he taught with authority; he wasn't an authority because he was popular or famous. Elsewhere, we also learn from him, in his desert temptation confrontations with Satan, that anyone can quote scripture, even against God's purposes. Today we hear that his authority was not like that of the scribes, who held the official positions of religious authority in his day. Our work is to do our best to discern the true prophets in our midst, and to be true prophets as well. The psalmist tells us how to do this: by not hardening our hearts when God speaks. If we truly listen to God, it will be God's very words filling our mouths. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co., Inc.
