From the Pastor's Desktop

A Message from Father Charles Puthota February 18, 2024

Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

Musings on the Season of Lent: This sacred season started on a good note on Ash Wednesday. At St. Elizabeth parish, we celebrated two well-attended Masses that day: at 8:30 a.m. and 6.00 p.m. Crosses of ashes were traced on our foreheads with the words, "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return." Dust and death are strong reminders on Ash Wednesday. An intense language indeed! And a wake-up call! This external ritual of ashes has a profound inner meaning. We are called to wear them on our hearts as God is calling us to prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. The ashes and the words about our returning to dust are reminders that our lives in this world are not permanent. In fact, we do not own anything in the world, even though we have an illusion of it. If we really owned anything, we would be able to take it into the next world. This season of Lent, we are to gain perspective on what to do in this life, how to live and love, how to relate to people and things, what is important and what is not, what is eternal and what is not, what matters and what doesn't, what is true happiness and what isn't. When we are able to see these things a bit more clearly, when we awaken to the reality of life, it is then we will truly begin to live from the soul. Lent is a special time to figure these things out. Sometimes, we can go through decades of life or a whole lifetime, without discovering what God wants us to do and how he wants us to live. As we are engaged in all sorts of spiritual activities, devotions, and rituals this season, let all these efforts converge on a deepening and maturing relationship with God in Jesus Christ---and others---where love and humility will shine forth. Happy hunting this season of Lent---for all the blessings money cannot buy!

Lenten Retreat on Saturday March 02: You are most welcome to sign up for this retreat that I'll be preaching on Saturday, March 02. Theme: Spirituality and Some Practices. It will start with the 8:30 a.m. Mass followed by light breakfast and coffee; then I'll give three sessions of reflections. It will all end with a catered lunch. Registration fee: \$15. The Word of God this First Sunday of Lent: Jesus in Mark's gospel goes into the desert for forty days. He is tempted by the evil one. He lives among wild beasts and is ministered to by the angels. Then he comes into his public ministry proclaiming: "This is the time of fulfillment. The kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the gospel." Lent is the time of fulfillment. It simply means, "It's about time we realized that we are being encountered by Jesus." The Kingdom of God is here and now. God's rule over our lives is happening right now. Will we let him take control of our lives to lead and guide us? Or are we going to go on our own ways that are contrary to God, love, and the deepest and greatest longings of our life? Are we going to go on making poor choices that bring sadness and grief or are we going to hear Jesus speaking clearly and creatively in the midst of all our preoccupations? Repentance is not a sad thing, but a happy

form of growth and development. It is to forget the harmful things we do to ourselves and others.

It was an occasion also for me to have a pulse on the life of the parish and to explore together with those actively involved about what more we could do for God and his people in our parish. 

PEOPLE OF THE COVENANT

If there is one word that stands out in today's readings, it is "covenant." God's faithfulness and goodness serve as examples to us of how to live. Genesis tells the story of Noah and of God's covenant not only with all people, but with all of nature. Never will the cleansing waters of the flood bring their destructive power to all the earth again. The sign, the reminder to both God and nature, is the rainbow in the heavens.

The psalm reminds us of this compassion of God, and begs God to remember us, not because of our goodness, but because of God's goodness and fidelity to the promise. God shows us how to be good, not by decree, but by example.

LENTEN REMINDERS AND REGULATIONS:

The following regulations are in place for abstaining and fasting during Lent:

During Lent, every Friday the 8:30 am Mass will be followed by the Stations of the Cross.

<u>Abstinence</u>: Everyone fourteen years of age and older is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday.

<u>Fast:</u> Everyone eighteen years of age and older but under the age of sixty is bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

On these two days, the law of fast allows one full meal a day, but does not prohibit taking some food during the day, so long as this does not constitute another full meal. Drinking liquids during the day is permitted. When health or the ability to work would be seriously affected, the law does not oblige. In doubt concerning fast or abstinence, a priest assigned to pastoral ministry or confessor should be consulted.

In the spirit of penance, the faithful should not lightly excuse themselves from this obligation.
