From the Pastor's Desktop

A Message from Father Charles Puthota August 17, 2025

Dear St. Elizabeth Parishioners,

Word of God: 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C: Jesus makes a startling declaration in the Gospel this Sunday: "I have come to bring fire to the earth, and how I wish it were already kindled!" These are not the soothing words of peace and comfort we often expect. Instead, Jesus speaks of division—even within families—as a result of his mission. What is this fire? It is the fire of God's love, truth, and justice that purifies and transforms. Jesus is not advocating conflict for its own sake, but acknowledging the reality that following him demands courageous choices that may not always be popular, even with those closest to us.

There is a saying: God comforts the disturbed and disturbs the comfortable. Discipleship is not always peaceful or comfortable. Sometimes, it calls us to stand up for the truth, to challenge injustice, and to remain faithful to Gospel values in a world that often resists them. The values of Jesus are countercultural. This can create tension — even division — but it also brings integrity, freedom, and the joy of living in God's truth.

The fire Jesus speaks of is the passion of the Holy Spirit, urging us to live not lukewarm lives but ones marked by zeal, conviction, and purpose. Look at the transformation that happened on Pentecost day when the fire of the Holy Spirit burned away the fear and anxiety of the disciples and transformed them into courageous and fearless witnesses to the Risen Christ. In a culture tempted by compromise and comfort, Jesus invites us to burn with love, to light up the world with faith, and to have the courage to stand firm when it counts.

August 19, My Ordination Anniversary: 36 Years a Priest: Please see pictures of my Ordination Day, August 19, 1989, on the last page of the bulletin. I have now been a priest for 36 years, 13 of those as a Jesuit priest and 23 as a priest of the Archdiocese of San Francisco. Including my seminary years before my Ordination, I have been in God's service now for 52 years. I was not fortunate enough to have my mother Martha alive at my Ordination. My father Isaac was proudly in attendance, but he went home to God in 2017. My three brothers and two sisters were present. Immediately following my Ordination, at the same Mass, I presided over my brother John Nicholas' (and Prema) wedding and baptized my niece and nephew. Please keep me and my family in your prayers. Service to God and His people continues. I'm deeply grateful for all your affection and inspiration, for your support and encouragement, your goodwill and friendship. On a daily basis, day after day in my ministry, you have become my family, and we together form God's family. The Opening Prayer in the Roman Missal for the Priestly Ordination Anniversary captures my sentiments joyfully and gratefully:

"Holy Father, who, by no merit of my own, chose me for communion with the eternal priesthood of your Christ and for the ministry of your Church, grant that I may be an ardent yet gentle preacher of the Gospel and a faithful steward of your mysteries."

From the Compendium of the Catechism of the Catholic Church: In what way is the Church the body of Christ? The risen Christ unites his faithful people to himself in an intimate way by means of the Holy Spirit. In this way, those who believe in Christ, in as much as they are close to him especially in the Eucharist, are united among themselves in charity. They form one body, the Church, whose unity is experienced in the diversity of its members and its functions. Who is the Head of this body? Christ "is the Head of the body, the Church" (Colossians 1:18). The Church lives from him, in him and for him. Christ and the Church make up the "whole Christ" (Saint Augustine); "Head and members form, as it were, one and the same mystical person" (Saint Thomas Aquinas). Why is the Church called the "Bride of Christ"? She is called the "Bride of Christ" because the Lord himself called himself her "Spouse" (Mark 2:19). The Lord has loved the Church and has joined her to himself in an everlasting covenant. He has given himself up for her in order to purify her with his blood and "sanctify her" (Ephesians 5:26), making her the fruitful mother of all the children of God. While the term "body" expresses the unity of the "head" with the members, the term "bride" emphasizes the distinction of the two in their personal relationship.

The Sound System in the Church: Having listened to the concerns of many of you over several months, I have proceeded to order further improvements to our sound system We have added two new speakers on either side in the church---and delicate fine tuning has been made, all at the cost this time of almost \$13,000. There seems to be a general satisfaction from most of you about the results of this new version of our sound system. Now people are able to hear clearly from any section of the area inside the church. If you have any feedback, please do pass it on to me. All this effort and expense is worth it if only we could hear well inside the church. The purpose is so that we could all pray and worship together with deeper faith and more active participation. I would like to thank our sacristans David Gemignani and Phil McCarthy for their assistance.
