From the Pastor's Desktop

A Message from
Father Charles Puthota
January 25, 2026

Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

Word of God: 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year A: In today's Gospel, we witness the official "launch" of Jesus' public ministry. After the arrest of John the Baptist, Jesus doesn't retreat in fear; instead, he moves into the heart of "the land of gloom." By settling in Capernaum—the region of Zebulun and Naphtali—Jesus fulfills Isaiah's prophecy: *"The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light."*

Jesus' first message is direct: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." This isn't just a call to feel sorry for sins; the Greek word *metanoia* implies a total "change of mind"—a 180-degree turn in how we see the world. We see the immediate fruit of this repentance in Peter, Andrew, James, and John. When Jesus says, "Follow me," they don't ask for a business plan or a salary range. They immediately leave their nets. Their "nets" represent their security, their identity, and their past. To follow the Light, they had to let go of the shore.

St. Paul, in our second reading, reminds us that this Light is meant to unite us, not divide us. He chastises the Corinthians for breaking into factions. When we focus on our "nets"—our personal preferences, politics, or egos—we create darkness. When we focus on the Call, we find unity. Today, Jesus is walking along the "shore" of your life—in your office, your home, or your struggles. He is the Light that dispels the gloom of our anxiety and the "yoke" of our burdens. What "nets" is He asking you to drop today so that you can walk more freely in His light?

Wednesday, January 28, Feast of St. Thomas Aquinas,

Priest and Doctor of the Church: On the Feast of St. Thomas Aquinas, the Church honors one of her greatest minds and a humble servant of truth. Born in 1225 into a noble family in Italy, Thomas became a Dominican friar against his family's wishes and devoted his life to the study of God. Living in the high age of **Scholasticism**, he helped

shape a method that sought harmony between **faith and reason**, drawing deeply from Scripture, the Fathers of the Church, and the newly rediscovered philosophy of Aristotle. In the universities of Paris and Naples, Thomas taught that reason, when rightly used, does not threaten faith but serves it. His masterpiece, the *Summa Theologiae*, reflects the scholastic method: precise questions, careful objections, reasoned responses, and clear conclusions. Yet Thomas never reduced theology to intellectual exercise alone. For him, study was prayer, and truth led to worship. Near the end of his life, after a profound mystical experience, he called his writings "straw" compared to the reality of God. St. Thomas reminds us that learning is meant to deepen love, and that the ultimate goal of all knowledge is not argument, but holiness.

Saturday, January 31, Feast of St. John Bosco, Founder of the Salesian Order: On the Feast of St. John Bosco, we honor a 19th-century priest whose life transformed the care of youth. Born in 1815 in Castelnuovo d'Asti, Italy, John Bosco grew up during the social upheavals of the Industrial Revolution, when poverty, child labor, and moral neglect threatened many children. Ordained in 1841, he ministered tirelessly in Turin, opening oratories, schools, and workshops to educate and protect young people. In 1859, he founded the **Salesians of Don Bosco**, inspired by St. Francis de Sales' gentle approach, to continue his work. Using reason, religion, and loving kindness, he showed that faith and joy could guide hearts. St. John Bosco's witness teaches us that patience, creativity, and compassionate care can bring God's light to the most vulnerable, forming not only minds but souls for Christ.

LIBERATION AND REFORM

While you might have to reach for an atlas to determine that Isaiah is speaking about Galilee, today's first reading (part of which was read at Christmas) is prophetic of Jesus' future ministry in that province. The light that brings salvation and rejoicing is, ultimately, Christ. Liberation is the theme: liberation from both ignorance ("darkness") and sin (the "yoke").

As Isaiah identifies a place, so Paul describes an attitude: the attitude that develops, even among good people, of equating their own will with the common good. This always brings dissension, and so it has done in Corinth. Paul will not allow this; we are all members of "Christ's party." The gospel is not to divide us.

Matthew quotes from Isaiah in today's Gospel, presenting Jesus as the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecies. The theme is "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matthew 4:17). To spread this message, Jesus begins to select disciples, four of whom we meet today: Peter, Andrew, James, and John.

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TODAY'S READINGS

First Reading — The burdens that were once laid upon the people have been vanquished (Isaiah 8:23 — 9:3).

Psalm — The Lord is my light and my salvation (Psalm 27).

Second Reading — Paul exhorts the believers at Corinth: As there is one Christ, so too must there be no divisions among you. (1 Corinthians 1:10-13, 17).

Gospel — After calling his first disciples, Jesus goes throughout Galilee teaching, proclaiming the gospel, and curing the people (Matthew 4:12-23 [12-17]).
