Divine Office--Morning Prayer at 8:00 a.m.: Every day at 8:00 a.m. Monday through Saturday we have the Morning Prayer, which is the Prayer of the Universal Church. How would you describe him given your experiences? What names would you give him based on your personal life-journey? Does he make a difference in your life? These are vital questions for Christian life.
