Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

Archdiocesan Annual Appeal 2022 (AAA): Amount to be raised: \$30,500. **One Percent amount: \$305.** Please see the names of donors in the bulletin. We are all called to continue and complete the mission of Jesus Christ, a mission to help, heal, enlighten, and transform the world. The Archdiocese of San Francisco, entrusted with the preaching of the Gospel, seeks our support and collaboration. We are delighted to be of help so that the life of Christ may be made manifest in the three counties of the Archdiocese through a life of faith and service. May I invite everyone to participate in AAA and make a success of it in the next two or three weeks.

Baptisms: This whole month of February, I am doing baptisms on each Saturday morning in the Rectory chapel. I find it a special occasion to evangelize, in the sense of encouraging and inviting and challenging the families toward faith. We continue to “go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you” as Jesus has asked us to do. Saturday March 12 is Lenten Retreat: I'll be preaching a Lenten Retreat on the theme of Prayer on Saturday March 12. The current Synod: In the ceremony to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the institution of the Synod of Bishops in October 2015, Pope Francis declared that “the world in which we live, and which we are called to love and serve, even with its contradictions, demands that the Church strengthen cooperation in all areas of her mission.” (For a Synodal Church handbook) This call to cooperate in the mission of the Church is addressed to the entire People of God. In April 2021, Pope Francis initiated a synodal journey of the whole People of God, to begin in October 2021 in each local Church and culminating in October 2023 in the Assembly of the Synod of Bishops. From the Compendium of the Catechism of the Catholic Church: 1. **What is the plan of God for man?** God, infinitely perfect and blessed in himself, in a plan of sheer goodness freely created man to make him share in his own blessed life.
