Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

Gaudete Sunday of Advent: We are at the Third Sunday of Advent, also called Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday. Usually, rose-colored vestments are worn by the priest. The readings, especially the one from Isaiah, point to the invitation to rejoicing. Looking to the most auspicious and life-giving birth of Christ, we begin to rejoice. This process of rejoicing will culminate at Christmas time and spread throughout the Christmas season. The Advent season is going forward as it invites us to the person of Christ. The advent is about the advent of Christ. It's all about his coming into our lives. His coming is a dynamic reality, in that it happens as life happens for us. We are not the same as we were before. Our pilgrimage of life progresses with all sorts of new experiences of joy and struggle. In our current situation, Jesus meets us; he joins our journey; he walks with us and talks with us. He engages us wherever we are in our life-situations. Jesus Christ is ever ancient, ever new. Even as he changed to become a human person, he changes himself, adapts himself, incarnates himself, into our human situations. In joy, he rejoices with us. In our sorrows, he weeps with us. In our fears, he comforts us. In our despair, he hopes with us. While we anchor ourselves to Jesus Christ the Son of God, we know that Jesus is ever human, ever fresh, ever new, ever adaptable so that he can constantly capture our imagination and appeal to our deep desires and dreams, our laughter and longings. This is my personal prayer for you and me: **"Jesus, come meet me where I'm at this juncture of my life. Speak to me to my present needs. Heal me as I carry the burdens of my illnesses. Save me from myself and my loneliness and sadness. Touch me with your grace. Make my humdrum life shine with your love."**
