Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

Ascension Sunday Musings: Jesus ascended to his Father, having accomplished the mission entrusted to him. When you have the time, check out the beautiful stained-glass window of Ascension in our own St. Elizabeth Church, along with those of other Rosary Mysteries. Ascension is the divine mystery that we treasure this Sunday. The actual feast of the Ascension falls on the Thursday after the Sixth Sunday of Easter, but in order to help everyone to observe the Holy Day of Obligation, this feast has been moved to the Seventh Sunday in Easter season in most dioceses in the United States except those of Boston, New York, Hartford, Newark, Omaha, and Philadelphia.

Jesus continues to live and love after his resurrection. The Jesus of History now becomes the Jesus of Faith. The summaries of Jesus' life are again and again proclaimed in the Acts of the Apostles, especially by Peter and Paul, which we read from throughout the Easter season. Jesus came from the Father. He went about doing good. He suffered and died on the cross. He rose from the dead and appeared many times to different people, encouraging and affirming them. Now he goes back to his Father. He does not leave us orphans, though. He will send us the Holy Spirit, which we will celebrate next Sunday at Pentecost. He has also assured us that he will be with us always, even to the end of time. When Jesus lived in this world, he could not go to every place and every nation. Now in the Spirit, he desires to share the good news with everyone in the world. We are the messengers. Not only are we messengers, we are witnesses. All of us who have experienced Jesus as our way, the truth, and the life, we are to go and witness to others. In our words and deeds, in our values and vision, we are to make Christ known to the world.

This is the meaning of the feast of Ascension we celebrate this weekend. Jesus has passed on the baton to us. We have to carry it to others. The relay race is on. We are to do our part in taking Christ to our own family and friends, and beyond. The angels said at his Ascension: "Men of Galilee, why are you standing there looking at the sky? This Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven will return in the same way as you have seen him going into heaven." Until Jesus comes back to fulfill the destiny of the whole universe, which we call his Second Coming, we have a job to do as Christians. We have love to share, forgiveness to offer, mercy to show, peace to establish, and justice to uphold. We have the hungry to feed, naked to clothe, strangers to welcome, prisoners to visit, homeless to shelter. Remember, whenever we have done these to the least of our sisters and brothers, we have actually done it for Jesus Christ. These are all the tasks that Jesus commissions us to do. He needs our help. We are his eyes and heart, his hands and feet. The message of the Ascension is for us to continue and complete the mission of Christ.
