## Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

<u>Parish Consultors Meeting (PCM): Over 50 Club:</u> In this meeting held on June 27, various organizations of the parish reported their history and activities. Over 50 Club has been in our parish for a long time, for over 100 years or so. Initially, there were over 400 members in this organization. Currently, there are about 50 active members. If anyone would like to join, please you are most welcome. They meet on Thursdays for Bingo and fellowship. Once a month they have luncheon. It's always a joy for people to come together and enjoy social life. They also inform the members about the scams and robberies going on and alert them about how to avoid being victims.

Word of God: In the Gospel this Sunday, Jesus speaks some of the most consoling words: "Come to me, all you who labor and are burdened, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you and learn from me, for I am meek and humble of heart; and you will find rest for yourselves. For my yoke is easy, and my burden light." We may recall another message printed on the base of the Statue of Liberty: "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, The wretched refuse of your teeming shore. Send these, the homeless, tempest-tossed to me, I lift my lamp beside the golden door!" There are so many of us who are tired and burdened. We may feel fragmented and distressed. Some of us might feel trapped by circumstances with no way to escape. Life may be at times too burdensome. If we are with Jesus, there is peace and rest, despite storms and high seas. When we remain in Jesus, we can learn from him and grow to be like him, meek and humble. As a carpenter, he made the yokes easy for the animals to pull the load. If we yoke ourselves with him, then any burden we can pull in life. Burdens will still be there, but we'll be given the grace to face them with courage and imagination, with strength and serenity.

<u>A Slice of Parish History</u>: On June 7, 1914, old St. Elizabeth Church was formally dedicated by Archbishop Edward Hanna. On Valentines Day in 1972, the old church on the corner of Brussels and Wayland Streets was demolished and replaced by housing.
