## A Message from Father Charles Puthota

Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth,

Word of God: Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Let's give thanks to God: The refrain from our responsorial psalm this Sunday is: "Give thanks to the Lord, his love is everlasting." How various and abundant are God's blessings! His most amazing blessing is love. It's everlasting and eternal. His love is absolute, radical, and unconditional. His love is constant and abundant. So let's give thanks to God. In giving thanks, we acknowledge God as God and ourselves as creatures dependent on God. In giving thanks, we learn not to take God's blessings for granted. In giving thanks, we grow in sharing his blessings with others generously. In giving thanks, we become positive and upbeat and cease to be sullen, cynical, and discontented. So let's give thanks with all our hearts and minds. As in the first reading from Job, he is the one who has created everything and set their boundaries powerfully and providentially. In the second reading from Second Corinthians, we read that the love of Christ impels us. It's God's awesome love revealed in Jesus' love that led him to sacrifice himself. In our thanksgiving, let's be impelled by the love of Christ to be good and kind. Let the old things pass away. Behold, new things have come. We are a new creation in Christ. In the gospel from Mark, Jesus calms our storms and winds so that we could feel the assurance of his presence with us always, even to the end of time, no matter how insurmountable our troubles may seem. So let's give thanks to God in Christ who loves and graces us with blessings awesome and unimaginable.

Solemnity of the Nativity of St. John the Baptist (June 24): John the Baptist's birth is celebrated on June 24 and his Martyrdom commemorated on August 29. Blessed Virgin Mary is the only other saint whose birth (September 8) and her Assumption (August 15) are both celebrated. The date of June 24 is chosen to be exactly six months before Christmas, the birth of Jesus. Jesus himself paid the greatest tribute to John the Baptist: "Amen, I say to you, among those born of women there is none greater than John the Baptist" (Matthew 11:11). Even when he was in his mother Elizabeth's womb, he leaped for joy at the presence of Jesus still in his mother Mary's womb. Thus, he represents the whole human race making the movement, the journey, the leaping, the dancing, toward Jesus throughout history. He baptized Jesus in the midst of the Trinitarian revelation. Last of the prophets of Israel, he was the first to testify to Jesus, as he prepared the way for him and pointed him out when he came, saying "Behold the lamb of God." He gave his life in witness to truth. May we too, like John the Baptist, have the wisdom to prepare the way for Jesus in our times and circumstances, point him out to one another, and stand up truth, peace, and justice.

<u>Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul (June 29):</u> At St. Peter's Square, huge statues of these two giants of saints are looking over the millions of visiting pilgrims who come from around the world. Peter who was given the keys of the Kingdom and Paul the mission to be the apostle to the gentiles. Peter's mission as the first pope and shepherd and Paul's ministry in propagating the risen Christ outside the borders of the Jewish lands have become the models of the Church, which is to preserve the mission and the tradition of the Church and to push constantly the frontiers of missionary activity. Peter denied Jesus three times and the tiple profession of his love for Jesus was all that Jesus asked for. Paul persecuted Jesus and his followers but he was to be transformed into the greatest promoter of Jesus and his Church. Both the saints gave their lives for Christ in witness to the fullness of life we are all called to embrace.
