<u>Memorial Mass for Sr. Anne Kelley, RGS:</u> Last Saturday we held a Memorial Mass for the dear departed soul of Sr. Anne, followed by reception in Cantwell Hall. About 75 people attended the event. Sr. Marquerite Bartling and Sr. Olga Cristobal along with our parish choir and other volunteers made excellent arrangements for the Mass and food. It was a heartfelt farewell to Sr. Anne. May she rest in peace!

Word of God: Pope Francis in his Angelus address on March 13, 2016, said: "The woman caught in adultery represents all of us, that we are sinners, adulterers before God, traitors to his loyalty. And her experience is God's will for each of us: not our condemnation, but our salvation through Jesus.... God does not nail us to our sin, does not identify us with the wrongs we have committed. He wills that our freedom be converted from evil to good, and this is possible----it is possible!---with his grace." The respect and sensitivity with which Jesus relates to this woman in the heartbreaking situation captures powerfully how God our Father loves us with a merciful and everlasting love. Let the one without sin throw the first stone! No one is without the stain of sin. It is obvious, therefore, that we are all called to love one another with gentleness and forgiveness. The Heavenly Father makes the Sun shine on the good and the bad and makes the rain fall on everyone indiscriminately. What did Jesus write on the ground? What he wrote, his Word, spoke to the accusers in judgment, and they fled the scene because Jesus held a mirror up to them. They saw themselves flawed and sinful and they had no business whatsoever to condemn the woman. The double standards in applying morality to women and men is another aspect of this Gospel story, a social phenomenon present in almost all countries and cultures.

A Story to Ponder: The Cup of Tea: A Zen master once received a university professor who came to inquire about Zen. The professor spoke at length about his own ideas, knowledge, and opinions. The master quietly listened and then invited him for tea. He began pouring tea into the professor's cup. He poured until the cup was full, but he didn't stop. The tea overflowed onto the table and then onto the floor. Shocked, the professor exclaimed, "Stop! The cup is already full! No more will go in!" The Zen master smiled and said, "Like this cup, you are full of your own ideas and opinions. How can I teach you Zen unless you first empty your cup?" Insight: True wisdom comes not from what we already know, but from making space for new understanding. To grow, we must first let go of our attachments and open ourselves to fresh insights.

Please do come join the Holy Week's liturgical celebrations with great devotion so that we could be led to the spiritual joys and graces of the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ at Easter.
