## A Message from Father Charles Puthota

Word of God: Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time: Jesus sends us out. It happens continuously. He sends us out not to a faraway country as missionaries, though at times it might happen, but for most of us, most of the time, Jesus sends us out to our own family, neighborhood, friends, organizations, work places, parish community, etc. to continue and complete the mission of Christ. Jesus did that over 2000 years ago when he sent the 72 disciples "to every town and place he intended to visit." He said to them: "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few; so ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest." We are called to cure the sick and proclaim the Kingdom of God. Toward the end of the passage today, Jesus cautions them not to gloat over the fact of the demons obeying them but rather because their names are written in heaven. Our names are written in heaven. The call, therefore, is to live up to the truth that we belong to this earth as well as to heaven. Our life journey is oriented toward making this world a better place where the Kingdom of God would come. Our life is also oriented toward the ultimate union we will have with God to live for eternity in joy and peace. That's where our dear departed ones have gone. That's where we shall go one day. May the life we have with Jesus on a daily basis as he sends us out to one another, to love and serve, lead us to our fulfillment and happiness now and into eternal life.

**Jubilee Year 2025**: The Jubilee Year, proclaimed by Pope Francis and now presided over by Pope Leo XIV, is a special Holy Year of grace and spiritual renewal in the Catholic Church, celebrated every 25 years. It began on December 24, 2024, and will end in December 2025, its theme is **"Pilgrims of Hope."** We are half way through this year. It invites the faithful to deepen their relationship with God through prayer, pilgrimage, confession, and acts of mercy. Millions are expected to visit Rome and pass through the Holy Door of St. Peter's Basilica, symbolizing the passage to salvation. The Jubilee emphasizes forgiveness, reconciliation, and social justice, encouraging outreach to the poor, the marginalized, and those in need of hope. Pope Francis had also urged a "Jubilee of Justice," promoting ecological and economic responsibility. As the world emerges from recent crises, including the pandemic and global conflicts, the Jubilee 2025 seeks to unite people in faith, healing, and hope for a more compassionate future.
