Dear Parishioners of St. Elizabeth

Advent: We are at the Third Sunday of Advent. The joyful and mournful song "O Come, O Come Emmanuel..." expressing the deep desire of expectation for the Lord is the theme of the season. Jesus is the reason for the season. This season of Advent is also a semi-penitential season as we wait for Christmas. Through prayer and penance, we shall wait for the joy of God becoming one with us. This is a time of our waiting for Jesus as we long for him to enter our lives again so we can start all over again. It is yet another chance for us to get it right. Shall we renew our hearts and minds for his presence and love? He came, he will come, but now he comes. This is also a hectic time of external preparations and commerce. In the midst of it all, we still have to keep our hearts fixed on Jesus, the holy baby to be born. The question we could ask is: Do we really feel deep down that we need Jesus in our lives? It is that deeply felt need for Jesus that will make this season of Advent meaningful and purposeful. If we think we can manage our lives without Jesus, all the preparations for Christmas would purely be a social and cultural observance and not a spiritual experience of Jesus. It would all be external---and nothing to do with the internal purification and renewal. It is Jesus who can truly bring peace and joy to us.

Word of God, Third Sunday of Advent, Year A: The Third Sunday of Advent invites us to rejoice, for the Lord is near. Known as Gaudete Sunday, it shifts the tone of the season from quiet waiting to joyful anticipation. The rose candle glows with hope, reminding us that God's promises are already unfolding. In the Gospel, Jesus points to the signs of the Kingdom: the blind see, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, and the poor hear good news. These are not merely ancient miracles; they reveal how God continues to enter our world with healing and compassion.

John the Baptist, imprisoned and burdened with uncertainty, sends his disciples to ask Jesus if He is truly the Messiah. Jesus' response reassures not only John but us as well: God is indeed at work, often quietly, steadily, and tenderly. Advent teaches us to recognize God's presence in places we might overlook—small acts of kindness, words of encouragement, and moments of unexpected grace. As we move closer to Christmas, we are called to become witnesses of Christ's joy in a weary world. Let us rejoice, not because all our problems are solved, but because God walks with us. His nearness transforms waiting into hope and hope into joy.
