Dear St. Elizabeth Parishioners

Sunday, December 28, Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph: “Love God and love one another.” This is the great commandment lived wholeheartedly by the Holy Family. The family is truly a *school of love*, where the earliest lessons of trust, sacrifice, and compassion shape the whole course of life. In Jesus, Mary, and Joseph we see a family that loved God deeply and loved one another faithfully, and from that love flowed a wider love for the world – a love that heals, serves, and transforms. Their family life was not free from uncertainty. Joseph had to trust God’s prompting and welcome Mary into his home amid confusion. Mary had to accept a mysterious vocation through the overshadowing of the Holy Spirit. Much was unclear, and yet they walked forward guided by God’s light. They faced danger and vulnerability, fleeing to a foreign land to protect the Child from death. With Jesus at the center of their home, God’s blessing filled their lives.
