Word of God: Jesus meeting the disciples on the way to Emmaus: The gospel today from Luke 24 is one of the most favorite ones for me in the whole Bible. The two Emmaus disciples are disillusioned and downcast that their messiah had been killed. Jesus joins them---and even pokes a little fun at them. He listens to their sad story. But he also speaks to them about himself by interpreting the scriptures. Their hearts begin to burn. He joins them at the table: Takes the bread, blesses it, breaks it, and gives it to them. They recognize him instantly, but he disappears. They are filled with energy and awe. Fired up, at that late hour they travel back to Jerusalem to proclaim to others that they had seen him. It was too good a personal experience to keep to themselves. In this story, we can put ourselves, our families, communities, and the Church in the place of these two disciples. The lives of these two disciples parallel ours. We have our disappointments and defeats. He listens to our stories attentively. Do we bother to let him know our longings and struggles? Do we speak to him lovingly and trustingly? As he speaks to us, our hearts burn. Are we even aware of our hearts burning? There are inner stirrings and invitations from the Risen Lord about the new life he is offering us. His presence and grace, his message and meaning lead us to spiritual consolation and affirmation. Do we recognize him on the road, on the main street, in the market place, in the breaking of the bread, in our waking and sleeping moments, in our eating and playing, in our comings and goings, in our entertainments and endeavors, in our work and preoccupations? We are not alone. He is with us, the Risen Christ! Can we able to discern in all our situations and circumstances the ever-present Jesus walking with us, talking with us, and revealing himself to us?
